Shenango High School received the PA Governor's Expanding Excellence Grant. The Expanding Excellence Grant is a program that focuses on creating a culture of innovation and achievement in Pennsylvania's schools through recognition, collaboration, mentoring, and sharing the best practices available between schools.

"Shenango was recognized for scoring above 90 on the School Performance Profile (SPP) and selected to model our strategies for two SPP indicators, Science/Biology and Advanced Placement. Two teams of faculty members and administration were selected to create replication tools which will be used by other schools as resources for school improvement," Shenango's primary grant writer Mr. Barron explained.

"It was a team effort between teachers and administration," furthered principal Joe McCormick. "Everyone was involved in drafting and developing the application, a replication tool for other schools to understand what we are doing that is effective, and presentation materials for an upcoming conference." Though the primary benefit of receiving two \$25,000 grants was admirable in and of itself, the grant also "allows us to showcase some really good things our teachers and students are doing." The funding from the grant was very helpful towards the creation of the replication tool as well as paying for the team's ex-

The funding from the grant was very helpful towards the creation of the replication tool as well as paying for the team's expenses to attend the conferences to share Shenango's practices and successful techniques with other schools. Further funding from the grants will be used by Shenango High School to help further improve programs related to student growth and achievement.

"I am very pleased to be able to share with other schools the methodology we've used at Shenango to achieve such outstanding achievement and student growth on the Biology Keystone Exam," explained Katie Sherry, biology teacher. "We will be mentoring Union Area School District and also presenting at a conference to other schools across the state that are interested in bettering their biology programs. We will explain how our course structure, supplemental programming, and remediation efforts have enabled our biology students to perform above the state average."

Biology teacher Nate Flood added that "while the Biology Achievement grant team includes Mrs. Sherry and myself, it truly is a result of a collaborative effort of numerous individuals over many years and a product of how hard our students work within the school."

There are numerous ways this grant benefits Shenango School District. Shenango was able to secure funding to enhance programs involving academic success and growth. "During the conferences, Shenango was able to build relationships and share best practices with other school districts. This collaboration will not only help the other districts involved, but will also help Shenango remain a leader in education," Mr. Barron said.

#### Traditional Public Schools Continue to Outperform Charter Schools

The 2013-14 School Performance Profile (SPP) scores showed that traditional public schools perform well, while charter schools continue to lag in performance. The PA Department of Education (PDE) announced the results of the 2013-14 SPP that showed 2,134 of 2,947, or 72%, public school buildings earning a 70 or higher, which included both Shenango High School (SPP - 84) and Shenango Elementary School (SPP - 72). Compared to the 2012-13 profile, the percentage of schools with a 70 or higher has held steady at 72%. The results are available at www.paschoolperformance.org.

PSBA's examination of the SPP scores showed traditional public schools continued to outperform their charter and cyber charter counterparts. Based on a scale of 100, the average SPP score for a traditional public school was 76.9, brick and mortar charter schools was 65.1 and cyber charters was 48.9. The department has indicated a 70-point score or higher is the mark of moving toward success.

"Public schools continue to perform well under tougher academic standards and in the face of a difficult environment including funding and tax issues, and the unfortunate need to lay off staff and cut programs and services," said PSBA Executive Director Nathan Mains.

"These results show that, compared to 2012-13, the majority of our public schools are performing well even though the state has recently revised its academic standards and is transitioning to more rigorous assessments," Acting Secretary of Education Carolyn Dumaresq said in a PDE news release. She noted that, compared to last year, the percentage of schools that earned below 60 declined by nearly 1%, indicating that student achievement is improving as a number of schools target resources to improve student academic performance.

While there is room for improvement for all schools, it is clear charter schools, especially cyber charter schools, need to be held to the same accountability standards as traditional public schools so all students receive a quality education. In the new legislative session, PSBA hopes that charter school reform will be considered.

#### Safety First

Thanks to the Safe Schools Initiative Target Grant that was awarded last year, Shenango School District continues to provide an even safer environment for students and staff.

A total of nine new cameras were installed throughout the building in locations ranging from the front lobby to the cafeteria to the second floor. These HD cameras, monitored by administrators and by the school security officer, are "very clear and have a zoom feature, unlike the old cameras," explained security officer Dave Tyler. "The new cameras were installed at Shenango High School and augment the existing cameras which are placed everywhere throughout both schools inside and outside leaving very few dead spots. The cameras record and store activity for months. If an incident occurs, I can review the footage to determine exactly what happened in a timely manner."

Principal Joe McCormick was ecstatic about the installment of the new cameras. "The new cameras are a significant upgrade in the quality and functionality compared with the old cameras. The quality of picture and ability to zoom and still see clearly have been a great asset for both open spaces like the cafeteria and in crowded places like long hallways with lockers," stated McCormick.

Shenango can add this grant to the growing list of accolades it continues to receive. "The grant was awarded through a competitive process which was open to all Pennsylvania schools. Throughout the state of Pennsylvania, 110 school districts were selected by the PA Safe Schools Office to receive grants after submitting a proposed overview of the project," said Brett Barron, director of transportation and school grants. "The funding from the grant was used to make various safety improvements across the district. Shenango was able to increase the quality and coverage of our security system by installing new cameras and district emergency communication equipment."

There are many beneficial factors to the installation of the new cameras. "Shenango School District will see a number of benefits that stem from the completion of this project. With the increased quality and coverage of our security equipment Shenango will be able to provide an even safer environment for students and staff.

### Shenango Band and Chorus Excel

November 18 at Westminster College, Shenango had FIVE students successfully audition into the PMEA District 5 Honors Band! ## SEL Program Impacts Student Lives

Shenango School District is introducing a new initiative to its students and staff. Social and emotional learning, otherwise known as SEL, is a program that will "help students to prepare for life effectively by creating a more harmonious social and emotional environment within the public school" says high school assistant principal Al Dorsch. "I believe in our students. Teaching in the high school for over 15 years showed me that not everyone defines respect the same way. We need a tool for setting social expectations, and teaching SEL in a great start."

SEL is expected to help students in a number of ways. Some of these include making good decisions, maintaining and managing emotions, creating healthy relationships and caring and being tolerant of others and their differences. In the elementary, "the collective decision was made to create and implement our own School Wide Positive Behavior system --The Wildcat Way," said Mr. Dorsch. "The Wildcat Way, as SWPBS indicates, rewards students for showing expected behaviors."

Stemming from a team of teachers who partnered with the Midwestern Intermediate Unit IV, this team was responsible for taking their knowledge and training the elementary staff, who in turn, "trained all the students and continue to train them regarding the behavioral expectations of The Wildcat Way," principal Adam Vincent explained. "The Wildcat Way teaches the students how to be safe, responsible, and kind across all settings." These setting range from the bus to the cafeteria to recess, which helps "maintain a consistent and teachable approach to what is expected of our students," Vincent said.

The high school took on the initiative with the 7th and 8th grade and then plans to gradually incorporate specially designed SEL endeavors into the 9th-12th grade classes. Field trips for the 7th and 8th grade set the tone for this program. These field trips included the 7th grade Moraine Trip and the 8th grade Camp Lutherlyn trip. "The purpose is for the students to accept the differences of their peers and to treat each other with respect. Students participated in some type of physical activity and had discussions about many topics which required deep reflection on their part," said school counselor Deanna Othites.

Each trip zeroed in on both life lessons as well as lessons about teamwork. The Moraine trip acronym was WILDCAT (Will, Integrity, Listener, Diversity, Compassionate, Attitude, Teamwork/Trust). Mrs Othites explained, "The setting is great for real life lessons, such as science relating to students that diversity not only takes place within our school and classes, but also in nature."

At Camp Lutherlyn, 8th graders learned how their interactions with peers can affect them. Eighth grade algebra teacher Jaime Slamecka noted

that, "During the field trip, our 8th graders faced several challenging team-building activities. My group of students quickly realized how important positive communication was to successfully completing the tasks," she explained. "As the day passed, I watched the students improve significantly in their ability to communicate and effectively work together to accomplish their goals. I think it was a challenging, yet rewarding day for students."

To make these field trips successful, a lot of preparation is necessary on the teachers' part. "We are not simply going some place off campus to view a play or visit a museum. Our teachers put a great deal of time into activities that the students are doing off campus. So it's still preparing a lesson with the added pressure of remembering everything needed to make the lesson/trip successful," said Mrs. Othites.

"My hope is that students will build upon what they have learned by their participation in the field trips and put it into practice not only at SHS, but wherever they go," said Mrs. Othites. "That is the main goal, providing lessons to our students that will become lifelong practices, which hopefully will help them reach their full potential."

Another approach to strengthening the new SEL program is an initiative by the social studies classes through the Medal of Honor program. "The program is designed as a resource for students to explore the character traits of courage, commitment, sacrifice, patriotism, integrity, and citizenship," explained Miss Schuster, 8th grade social studies teacher.

"The program uses the remarkable stories of Medal of Honor recipients as inspiration for our developing citizens," added 9th and 10th grade social studies teacher Mrs. Merryman.

Through the SEL program, Shenango School District will be able to reach out to the students in a positive and encouraging way. The teachers and staff have been and are continuing to put forth a lot of effort to make this project a success. There is a change coming to Shenango and the SEL initiative is the window for this opportunity.

With these potential new advancements, the program would be a perfect fit for her.

her grades and the teachers' lesson plans. She finds it much easier to know of her missed work. "Teachers put up their lesson plans and you can check and see what you missed." Emma enjoys having this feature when she is unable to attend school and needs her work as soon as possible. In addition, she loves how facile it is to contact the teachers. Since each teacher has their own site, she can just click their link and contact them when necessary. With all of these new features, Emma has easily transitioned to this new program.

Converting to Parent Portal was definitely a huge adaptation. It provided a brand new website for parents and students and offered them so much more.
